Welcome back, CCGS members. Hope you enjoyed your summer break. Our first General Meeting will be on Tuesday, September 27 at 7 p.m. at the CCGS Annex. Our guest speaker is Brad Richardson from the Clark County Historical Museum. He will describe the research resources available at the Museum.

Brad Richardson is the curator at the Clark County Historical Museum (CCHM). He has been with the organization since 2010 and working professionally as a historian since 2012. He earned his Bachelor's degree in History from Washington State University Vancouver in 2012 and a Master's in Public History from Portland State University in 2015.

As curator Brad has spearheaded the expansion or creation of several foundational programs, such as a historical research workshop, seasonal walking tours, and the museum's lecture series. In addition to his work with the museums programming, Brad has assisted with, wrote, or curated several exhibitions at CCHM, such as *Above and Below the Fold: News Fit to Print*, *Curiosity: Clark County, Real and Imagined*, *Labor: A Working History*, *Shadows of Conflict: Clarke County and the Civil Way*, and *Food for Thought: Clark County's Food History*.

In November 2015, Brad received the Clark County Tourism Ambassador award from Visit Vancouver, Vancouver's local tourism marketing organization.

Currently, Brad is preparing for the winter 2016-2017 opening of CCHM's newest exhibit *All Aboard! Clark County Rides the Rails*, which will invite visitors to explore the history and importance railways have played in Clark County and Southwest Washington.

President's Message

Or, How I Spent My Summer Vacation

August 16th through the 20th was a whirlwind tour of the “four corners, occupied by Missouri, Kansas, Oklahoma and Arkansas. I was researching my Reese line, trying to discover what may have happened to John B. Reese to cause his death sometime before December of 18 and 56.

Tuesday, 16 August: 12:43am red-eye to Minneapolis then flight to Kansas City, Missouri at 8:23 and hit the ground running, trying to pack two weeks of research into a five-day sack. I drove to Independence to start my research at the headquarters of the Oregon California Trails Association. I was hoping to get a look at their newly acquired Chuck Martin Collection only to discover that it was actually the “still-hoping-to-be-acquired” collection. Alas and alack! ‘Twas not to be . . . YET! I did have a wonderful conversation with staff member Kathy Conway, who gave me good direction to other possibilities. Next, I went next door to visit the National Frontier Trails Museum where Richard Edwards facilitated a session in the library. Interesting stuff, but nothing relating to my guy.

Next, it was on to the Midwest Genealogy Center. Walking up to the doors, I thought I had died and gone to heaven! The Midwest Genealogy Center is a specialty library and a part of the Mid-Continent Public Library system in Missouri. It is the largest free-standing public genealogy facility in the nation. Filled with hard copy and digitized material, it is a treasure! Ably assisted by Kim A. I searched newspapers, obituaries and made use of their multiple subscription sites. Again, empty basket, but fun nonetheless.

Wednesday, 17 August: Up at 5:30, breakfasted and began a mind-melting, butt-numbing two-plus hour drive to Columbia, Missouri, home to The State Historical Society of Missouri at the University of Missouri. There I was able to peruse digitized newspaper records. There were several negative findings; people with the right names but in the wrong place and time. I did have a great pulled pork sandwich at the Heidelberg Restaurant. Aaand back to Independence.

Thursday, 18 August: Up at 5:30 in order to get to Butler, Missouri, home to the Bates County Historical Museum. There I was ably assisted by Chris Wimsatt. Chris is a generations-deep resident of Bates County and knows all the history and all the families there. I spent all morning poring over leather-bound record books, plat maps, and other goodies. I started this trip believing John B. died sometime before 19 December 1856, as that was the date his estate entered into probate. Chris was able to find this entry in a “Stray Book”: “Taken up by John B. Reese . . . (of) Charlotte Township in Bates County MO one stray . . . Strawberry Rone 3 years old 14 hands and 3 inches . . . this 24th day of May 1856” Woo Hoo! Now I’ve narrowed his death down to a seven month period!

A trip to the Bates County courthouse saw great help from Jennifer Bolling. She was able to locate the exact parcel of land John B. occupied. I have the Entry Land Warrant for him from 1851 and my assumption had been that is where they were for the 1860 and 1880 censuses (the Civil War took them out of the Bates County for the 1870 census). But wait! Here they are three miles west on eighty acres, the western boundary of which is the Kansas/Missouri border! First owner was John B. Reese and the 1875 Plat Book lists the owner as E. McReynolds. That’s the widow Reese, remarried. A subsequent driving trip to that spot indicated the current occupants have a farm operation, complete with agricultural type buildings and equipment BUT the residence is directly across State Line Road IN KANSAS!! Curiouser and curiouser. She also helped me garner some later marriage certificates and additional land transactions that still need to be analyzed.

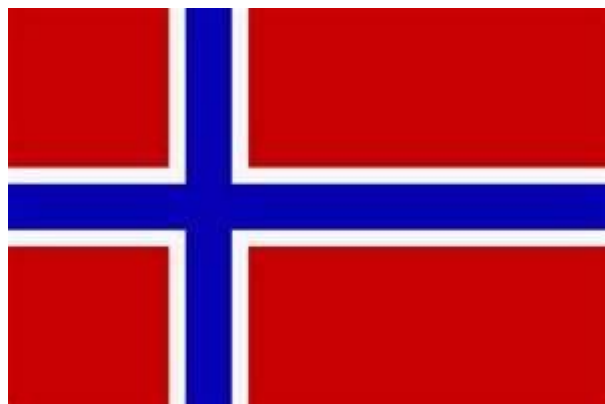
Friday, 19 August: The 1855-1860 time period was one of great upheaval on the Kansas/Missouri border. What became referred to as “Bleeding Kansas” was the bloody strife between pro and anti-slavery factions. Bates County was the flash point for it all. My next trip was to the John Brown Museum in Osawatomie, Kansas, (people think Northwest place names are hard to comprehend). There I met with Grady Atwater, the Site Administrator. Mr. Atwater wrote his Master’s Thesis on the Border Wars, Bleeding Kansas and the “Border Ruffians”. Although we came up with nothing definitive, we both are about 50 percent believing that John B’s death had something to do with the border strife. He recommended many new places for me to research and I know I will be occupied with them for many months. For that day, he recommended I visit the Miami (pronounced Myamuh, kinda like Mizzourah) County Historical Museum in Paola. There I received a great tip that Andersonville, Missouri was a center for Border War information. Unfortunately I was running out of time. I was planning to visit a cousin in Springdale, Arkansas and had to get on the road

Visiting with Cousin Marlin was a delight, if all too short. All-you-can-eat catfish and sweet tea at the Wagon Wheel Country Café! Then back to Joplin, Missouri for the night. While there I contacted cousin Shari in preparation for my visit with her and other family in Wann, Oklahoma on Saturday. Remember when I wrote about this in the April newsletter? Yes! THAT Shari Reese! She put me in touch with another sister and an hour conversation later, I had a bunch more juicy family lore, (but that’s for another newsletter).

Saturday, Aug 20th: The 88 miles between Joplin, Missouri and Wann, Oklahoma, went by very quickly and I was excited to finally meet Shari and her husband Scott, who is the actual blood-relative. We met in the cemetery and talked family for about an hour. I got pictures of all the family tombstones before heading out to Edmunds, Oklahoma to meet my granddaughter’s new husband Tanner.

All in all, it was a great trip. So many discoveries and SO much analysis to do. As always, more to be revealed.

The past is history, the future a mystery. Today is a gift! That’s why it’s called the present
