

If a quorum is present, we will have a short business meeting at 7:00 pm to elect officers for the coming year and to vote on the important change to our bylaws described below. Please come! **It is urgent that you attend, if only for the few minutes it will take to vote.** We cannot run a society without your help.

Our speaker is **Pat Holling**, currently Family History Consultant at both Vancouver North Stake and La Center Ward. Her topic is ***Your Family History Library - How to get the most out of your next visit.***

Join us at this meeting to hear about some changes in the local LDS library staffing and a little about what is going on in Salt Lake City. If you're not already using the local LDS resources, this is your chance to learn how and when to visit the local Family History Libraries.

Proposed Bylaws Change

A quorum of 8% of the membership was not present at the June meeting (40 members attended, 49 were needed), so we could not elect officers. President Diana Cruz accepted the resignations of those who did not plan to continue and appointed new people to take their places, following the bylaws on vacancies. The bylaws committee met on July 18, 2006, to address the quorum question. They reviewed how some other societies define a quorum: some require a certain number of members, some a percentage, some a mail ballot, and some a majority of those members present at the meeting.

The bylaws committee agreed on the following wording, and the Board concurred, for the recommended change. Deletions are noted by strikeouts and additions by underlining:

Article IV: Section 1. (b) Voting: 1. A quorum of ~~8% of members in good standing must be~~ shall consist of those members present at a publicized meeting to sustain a vote or elect officers. Unless specified otherwise herein, a simple majority of affirmative votes is required to constitute membership approval.

2. Information for those issues requiring a vote of the membership shall be published in the *Newsletter* prior to the meeting. ~~3. If a quorum is not reached at the announced meeting, the Board of Directors can determine if a mailing of the ballot is appropriate.~~

With the issues discussed in the *Newsletter* and the meeting publicized, members should be aware of what is happening and can make an effort to attend. Those present can hold an election or take a vote, and section 3. is not required. Bylaws Committee: Jane Germann, Karen Frost, Jeanine Bailiff, Diana Cruz, and Glen Jones. Clark County Cemeteries project

If you haven't yet visited the Clark County Cemeteries webpages, you're in for a surprise! This site at www.rootsweb.com/~wacclacem has individual web pages linked for every cemetery in Clark County, Washington. Only three cemeteries are on other sites and linked here. They are Fern Prairie, Poor Farm, and Post Military. All the rest are part of this huge project. Many already have photos of every stone in the cemetery. These include Fern Prairie, Sacred Heart, Mountain View, Salmon Creek Methodist, St. John Lutheran, Bethel Lutheran, Livingston, Sunnyside, Yacolt and Manor Wilson Bridge. Others are partially done and volunteers are diligently working to finish them.

Our eventual goal is to have photos of every gravestone in Clark County posted with the exception of the three largest cemeteries. These are Park Hill, Evergreen Memorial Gardens, and Camas. Any gravestone photos and obituaries for these three cemeteries that are sent to us will be posted on their respective sites. We also want to have spreadsheets showing the details for every burial in each cemetery. Some are already finished, such as Fern Prairie and Mountain View. Others are partially completed. It all takes time and many volunteers.

This huge web page undertaking (play on words!) is a project of our Research and Preservation Committee, headed by Jane Germann. The webmaster for the project is our CCGS webmaster, Patricia McKee Bauer. Several volunteers have been involved in photographing the gravestones; obtaining and retyping obituaries, plus formatting and typing the burial records.
