President's Message

As the old year winds down and I begin to think about the new year to come, my thoughts turn to family. During my childhood in the 1930s family members were not so widely scattered as they are now. Most lived in eastern Washington. My father had a job (He was a newspaper reporter) and we had a car (a 1929 Ford which my dad named "Alice"). That made us better off than many folks during those Depression years. At Thanksgiving we usually stayed home in Spokane and invited family friends who had no families of their own to have dinner with us. A particular favorite with my sister and me was an elderly bachelor who had lost an arm in a sawmill accident when he was seventeen years old. He kept us entertained with demonstration of how he could tie his shoelaces into beautiful bow knots with only one hand—much better than we could do with two hands.

At Christmas we usually drove north to Colville where my maternal grandmother lived. Sometimes Grandma would come to Spokane on the bus to spend Christmas with us. We usually had chicken for Christmas dinner, as Grandma raised chickens in her back yard, as did many people at that time. One memorable year, Grandma carried the live chicken to Spokane with her on the bus, planning to butcher it on Christmas morning. Grandma was a master at this part of the proceedings. She grabbed the chicken and tucked it under her left arm, making sure its wings were held tightly to its body out of her way. Meanwhile, Daddy had set a wood chopping block out in the snow in the back yard. Grandma grabbed her small ax in her right hand, laid the chicken's head on the chopping block, and with one sure blow the deed was done. But then, the chicken (minus its head) got away from Grandma and flopped in a big circle all around the back yard, leaving splotches of blood on the white snow. My sister and I danced and screamed with delight at this spectacle. Eventually the chicken was plucked, stuffed, and roasted and Christmas dinner proceeded as usual.

Looking ahead to the New Year, my sister and I were allowed to stay up until midnight on this one night. This was when my mother employed the time until midnight to guide us to make a list of our resolutions for the coming year—things we could do to improve ourselves. Not too long ago I ran across one of these lists among some family papers. My list is headed with the following; "This year Lethene resolves to be nicer to her little sister." Anyone besides me see a mother's fine hand in that one?

Have you written down the holiday stories of your families? If not, resolve to do it now. Share the memories, the stories, the pictures with your family members. Share the importance of keeping these memories and stories alive so that your children and your grandchildren will know what your life was like and how you affected and were affected by the history going on around you. To me, that's what family history is all about.

CCGS has its stories too—remember the great ones from our Spring 2014 seminar? We have accomplishments: two very successful seminars, excellent classes, interesting programs, and, most recently, donations from our members that will enable us to have ancestry available in our library this coming year, the Old City Cemetery project moving forward. We also have resolutions: One that we will focus on during the coming year is how to get more people coming to our library to use the excellent resources we have here. We need to put CCGS on a more stable financial basis. Increased membership is one major way to do this. Another is member contributions – donations of time and money. Thank you all for the many contributions made during this past year. If you have suggestions for how we can improve, how we can better serve our members, please contact me or any member of your CCGS Board. Please enjoy the holidays with your families and come back in 2015 with a resolution to be an actively participating member of the CCGs family.

The University of Oregon Libraries' Oregon Digital Newspaper Program (ODNP) will add images of more than 16 historic Oregon newspapers during the final year of its grant funding from the National Endowment for the Humanities' and Library of Congress' National Digital Newspaper Program (NDNP).

There are currently more than 650,000 pages of 65 historic Oregon newspapers (most published before 1923) on the website. They are keyword searchable, making it possible to search just one, some or all of the newspapers for an individual, business or other topic.

Digitization of the following 10 newspapers is now underway:

2. Dallas. Polk County Observer
3. Albany. State Rights Democrat
4. Salem. Daily Capital Journal/Capital Journal
5. Pendleton. East Oregonian: E.O.

8. St. Helens. Oregon Mist
9. Corvallis. Corvallis Gazette/Corvallis Times/Oregon Union/Union-Gazette

Margaret Colf Hepola
1917-2014

We are saddened to learn of the passing of CCGS member and benefactor, Margaret Colf Hepola on Saturday, December 6th, at her home. She was 97. Her obituary and news article appear in the Tuesday, December 9th edition of the Columbian. A graveside service will be held on Wednesday, December 10th at 1 p.m. at the Hayes cemetery near Woodland, with a Celebration of Life to be held on Friday 1 December 12 at 1 p.m., at the First Church of God in Vancouver.

Her obituary calls her a "regional treasure," and indeed she was. She was busy helping so many Clark County organizations, including the Clark County Genealogical Society.

Several of our CCGS members who knew and worked with her, share their memories of this busy and delightful lady:

From Sandy Thompson Librarian Director:

I am saddened by the death of my dear friend Margaret Colf Hepola. She died on Saturday Dec. 6, 2014. Those of us who have known her knows of the zest she had for life. She understood that CCGS was a valuable part of Clark County. She was a Historian for the North Clark County area. She was La Center Cemetery Sexton for some 52 years. There was so much she did in her lifetime with everything having a value of importance attached to it. And we are recipients of her work.

I was fortunate to work on her genealogy over the last 4 years and assisted her with her DAR papers. Some of her family came on the Mayflower and from Switzerland. Her family were pioneers in the Woodland, Cowlitz county area. Some came by wagon train in the 1860's to San Joachim County, CA from Illinois, before coming north.

CCGS has been so blessed to have been given by the Colf Foundation donations that have helped our library over the last few years.

In the spring of 2013 Margaret Colf Hepola was nominated to receive the Clark County First Citizen's award. Following is an excerpt from **Jane Germann's** supportive letters on her behalf:

"... as a very long time board member of the **Clark County Genealogical Society**, I have been impressed to see Margaret's generosity monetarily as well as giving the society ideas of where to seek grants. Her dedication of the heritage of the area is extraordinary. Margaret had given several smaller gifts over the years, but recently has given generously as a member of the Colf Foundation. Her verbal encouragement was also welcomed – she told us that she always mentions how helpful CCGS is in offering help to those seeking their personal heritage with individual help, by teaching classes, offering a genealogical based library and preserving records. We are incredibly thankful to Margaret for her support to our society.

"Margaret has been a great supporter of community efforts to preserve the history of the area. These examples are the ones I personally know she has supported. Margaret deserves to be made First Citizen!"

Jane also mentioned her involvement with the Clark County Historical Society and North County Museum.

Our final comments come from immediate Past President **Steve Cornick:**

Margaret Hepola was a grand lady. Sandy Thompson told me once that whenever she would visit Margaret she would find her energetically tending to her many and varied interests in our community. This despite being in her nineties and as deserving as anyone of simply retiring to her rocking chair and contemplating a life of outstanding accomplishment in the cultural life of Clark County. What a woman!

A few years ago, we had the pleasure of Margaret coming to our library for a program in which she and other members were given recognition for their role in supporting CCGS. As I spoke with Margaret, she said that she thought CCGS was the most important cultural heritage organization in Clark County. Coming from her I found those words a source of inspiration. I have striven to insure that CCGS lives up to that aspiration.

Margaret Hepola was not the most important member of CCGS. No member is more equal than any other. But without Margaret's support and inspiration we all are going to have to step up our game.

I am thankful that I had the privilege of associating with this fine lady.
